CARETAKER JOE RELEARNS A LESSON...AGAIN!

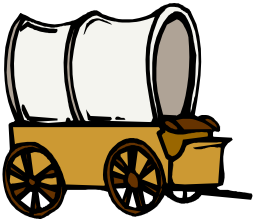
At last, a winter like condition has descended on the Northland, but it wasn't until the second week in December. While the mid-section of the country was blasted by the first big storm of the season, those of us up here in the Northland were watching the Weather Channel in utter disappointment as all of the snow and glorious nasty winter weather missed us well to the south. But just as hope was all but dashed, the winds came around and started to blow from the north-east, down Lake Superior, and brought us beautiful lake effect snow. Unlike the areas at the east end of the Great Lakes that can see lake snow events that last for days at a time due to the prevailing westerly winds, here at the western end of the Great Lakes we have shorter lived, though just as intense, lake snows. Where the east end of the Great Lakes will often see several feet of snow, here lake events usually only produce 10-15 inches. But it comes down hard while the wind is in the right direction, with one to two inches an hour quite common.



Well, as you can imagine after the snow stopped falling, the only thing I could think about was getting out my old 1975 Arctic Cat Pantera snowmobile and packing that fluffy mass of snow into a skiable track. I was so excited about grooming up the trails that I forgot a couple of things about old snowmobiles and deep snow that has fallen on bare ground in really cold temperatures. First off, I forgot that in 1975, snowmobile manufacturing was still in its relative infancy and the fancy geared pull start mechanism had not been invented yet. This meant that my 34 year old Arctic Cat, while still in excellent running order, is not that easy to start when the temperature is in the single digits. It all came back to me as I nonchalantly yanked at the starter rope, and the rope didn't move as far as the tendons in my wrist did! Oh yeah, cold weather starts require both hands, feet firmly planted, and a hard long full body tug that results in the motor turning about three revolutions by the end of the stroke. After about eight of these full bodied, two handed pulls, the motor starts to receive enough gas oil mix that you get about five revolutions per pull. Imagine, if you can, starting a lawnmower with molasses in the engine instead of oil, and you will begin to get a glimpse of what starting my snowmobile was like. So, after about a gallon of sweat and approximately 30 tugs at the starter rope, just when I thought I could tug no more, the motor jumped to life for its 34th winter season. As the motor warmed up to operating temperature, and I cooled down to my operating temperature, my excitement again built to a judgment clouding level. So, I hooked up the sled and set off down the trail toward the bike shack and tennis courts at the bottom of the Hill. Now, I hope that I'm not the only one, but do you ever have something you do annually, and annually make the same mistake the first time out? Well, every year I set out on the first deep snow trail groom with the sled attached, and every year when I come to the first hill on the course, I get the machine stuck due to the fact that the deep fluffy unpacked snow is so loose that it is being piled high on the sled, thus turning it into a large drag at the rear of the snowmobile. Have you ever seen one of those tractor pulls on TV where the farther the tractor pulls down the track the harder the sled it is pulling drags at the ground until the tractor stops moving and just starts to shoot dirt out from its back tires? Then you know exactly what happens to me and my 34 year old cat at the first incline we meet. I am also quickly reminded that in 1975 snowmobiles were made of heavy American steel...REALLY very heavy American steel! But, after another gallon of perspiration and temporary abandonment of the tracker sled, I am able to turn the machine back down the hill and am on my way down the trail for a first snow packing pass. One of these years I'll remember to be less excited and clearer headed. (Yeah, right!)
